Music tuition

Students and staff at Nemingha Public School have experienced the wide-ranging benefits of our music programs, not only in developing specific skills in music but in encouraging self-confidence and independent learning across all our key learning areas. Our music programs include offering tuition in a range of instruments as well as encouraging participation in music, dance, drama and poetry performances for classmates, for the school community and for the Tamworth community.

The Australian Curriculum, Assessment and Reporting Authority (ACARA) has identified general capabilities that should be taught across the curriculum as skills essential to living in the twenty-first century; these are embedded in the teaching of instrumental music.

Literacy

Students' literacy skills increase by learning to decode musical notation, as a unique language and to apply that knowledge in communicating that music to audiences.

Numeracy

Numeracy is a fundamental building block for music, particularly through the development of rhythm and ability to count and subdivide beats and bars. Students will also learn to recognise sequences, musical patterns, phrases and these reoccur in music.

Information and communication technology

Students can use software or interactive online programs to assist with rehearsal or home practice, use recording or ensemble pieces by notable performers to inform best practice, use composition or music notation software, and using audio and video recordings to facilitate student self and peer reflection.

Critical and creative thinking

It is the synergy of literacy, technique and performance where students have opportunities as musicians to develop and demonstrate creative thinking. It is also the capability to then critically reflect on own and others' performances that accelerates students' improvement as musicians.

Personal and social capability

When playing in ensembles, students build effective relationships with students from multiple year levels and abilities; developing skills to peer mentor and work as a team and contributing to the overall success of an ensemble performance. At an individual level, students manage their engagement in lessons and rehearsal beyond the routine of the normal school day, and demonstrate being independent learners through personal practice.

Ethical and intercultural understanding

Students develop appropriate acknowledgement for the sources of the music they perform in the music industry. Students also study music from a range of genres, cultures, styles and eras through the music they perform.

We have engaged the Tamworth Regional Conservatorium of Music (TRCM) to provide tuition in 2022 to continue to provide this service to families. Currently Ian Hocquard provides trumpet lessons to students on Thursday and we would be looking to increase this to include piano. Guitar and drum lessons will continue to occur in 2022 under the tutorage of Mr Alwyn Aurisch.

TRCM is the premier music education facility in the Tamworth region and one of 17 regional conservatoriums in NSW.

The conservatorium provides outstanding instrumental and vocal tuition to approximately 700 students of all ages in the community of Tamworth and the region.

Every effort is made to keep fees at an affordable level and the conservatorium provides numerous scholarships and bursaries to ensure that financially disadvantaged students are given equal opportunity to realise their talents.

Their highly skilled teachers provide individual, group and ensemble tuition to members of the community, and programs are designed to cater for a range of abilities from beginner to advanced. Currently teaching in 17 schools across the Tamworth area, the conservatorium is always eager to provide tailored music programs to school-aged children that reflect the NSW music curriculum.

We look forward to continuing our service to families by providing music tuition for those who wish to participate. Our new extracurricular room will be completed during the holidays and that will provide a soundproof learning space for our music lessons.

Healthy Lunch Box recipe

<u>Vegetable gratin</u>



Ingredients

Olive oil spray 1kg frozen chunky mixed vegetables, thawed 1 tbsp margarine

- 2 garlic cloves, crushed
- ¼ tsp dried thyme ¾ cup plain flour
- 1 tsp Dijon mustard
- 2 cups reduced-fat milk 1 cup reduced-fat cheddar cheese,
- arated
- Salt and pepper, to taste 1 cup fresh wholemeal bread crumbs

2 tbsp fresh parsley, chopped

- Serves 6

Method

Preheat oven to 190°C. Spray an 18 x 28 cm shallow baking dish with oil. Drain thawed vegetables well and set aside.

Melt the margarine in a saucepan over medium heat. Add the garlic and thyme and cook for 30 seconds. Whisk the flour and mustard into the milk and gradually whisk into the saucepan. Cook, whisking constantly, for 5 to 10 mins or until thickened. Remove from the heat and stir in % cup of the cheese until melted. Fold in the vegetables and pour into the baking dish.

In a bowl, combine the remaining cheese with the bread crumbs and parsley. Sprinkle over the vegetables and bake for 20 min or until golden brown.
